- The children opening the Treasure Box each week and their curious, expectant faces;
- Jeff McDonald as the silent clown in a Sunday Service during which we conspired to re-create a circus and he lit the chalice with a blow torch;
- The Black Lives Matter March in which 350 walked together, carrying balloons and showing that the work for justice can be beautiful and even joyful;
- Witnessing the Board make difficult but necessary decisions to bring the church onto firm financial ground and supporting one another in that work;
- Watching our most dedicated teachers preparing thoughtful and creative lessons for the children;
- Reflective moments in Sunday services when I could absorb the beauty of the sanctuary and the music created by so many, especially our youth on Easter Sunday;
- Many moments of laughter with Anji and Julie in the office, going through our daily and weekly routines.

But on May 21 we will say goodbye. And for UU ministers there are some important rules about saying goodbye. It is important for you to know that I will not be in touch with you, at least for a

year. If we are Facebook friends, I will “unfriend” you for a year. Harsh though that may seem, we do this because each and every UU minister has an ethical commitment stating that we will not, in any way, infringe on another colleague’s relationship with his or her congregation. Your new minister is about to arrive. As my Interim work is completed it is my job to get out of the way and let your hearts and lives attach to your called minister.

From your Ministerial Search Committee

In the life of our church, calling a minister ranks among the most significant acts of our congregation. Hopefully by now you have all heard the exciting news: we've made our unanimous (and wholeheartedly enthusiastic!) decision and invited Rev. Brian Mason to join us for Candidating Week! After over a year of following the UUA's strict protocol for confidentiality during this important search process, we're finally at the fun part and can welcome you all into the conversation about this next, exciting chapter for our church community. Our big project now is Candidating Week, Sunday April 30th through Sunday May 7. We'll try to answer some of the questions you may have about this important week:

What made you choose this guy? We were fortunate to have a strong pool of interested ministers. As we began initial interviews, we held strong to what you had all shared with us through the various surveys and conversations as our touchstone for the qualities we were seeking. Our search team represents a wide range of ages, life stages, occupations, and backgrounds and we were always mindful of the need to look for a candidate who would be the best match for our overall congregation. We prepared ourselves at the onset for the possibility that we may not find the right match this year, and that we would need to be strong enough to resist the urge to "settle" for a "pretty good" candidate. And then we had our first conversation with Brian, which led to the invitation for a neutral pulpit weekend together, and we all shared a sense of excitement that we had found such a great potential match for First UU Wausau.

As we mentioned in our initial announcement, the committee was most impressed with Brian's obvious excitement about ministry and in conducting worship services, his collaborative nature, his curiosity and intelligence, his listening skills, as well as his healthy sense of humor. We all feel that Brian has a genuineness that shone brightly from our very first conversation with him. In addition, Brian had exemplary recommendations, and was described both as: "enthusiastic, engaging, energetic and passionate," as well as "thoughtful, creative, and just

quirky enough to make him very appealing." And after getting to know him through the extensive interviews, we were delighted to discover that he delivers engaging and thought-provoking sermons, which seek to bridge both the head and the heart.

We will be happy to share with you all as much as you'd like to know about our experience with Brian during the opportunities for conversation that Candidating Week will bring, and we also welcome any emails and requests to get together. This is the time to ask questions and share concerns and keep open lines of communication so you feel 100% ready to cast your vote on May 7th.

What does it mean, "call the minister?" The Search Committee has worked long and hard to select our candidate, but the congregation has the final say. At the congregational meeting on May 7th, the congregation votes to affirm the Search Committee's choice. With an overwhelming yes vote, Brian will know that the congregation has truly "called" him to be our minister.

What is Candidating Week, anyway? It's when you'll get to know Brian "up close and personal," and he'll get to know the people who make our church so special. We've told him a great deal about our congregation, but this is a time of mutual discovery, a time to get to know the real people. We will all have time to share what we love about this church, talk about our passions and concerns, and tell our stories.

Absentee ballots must be submitted before the congregational meeting. Before this meeting, we hope you will enjoy getting to know him as much as we have. You have put great trust in us to choose the best for our church, and we are grateful for that trust. We look forward to continuing this exciting journey of our church's future together.

Barb's commitment to this church and its people remained strong, even years after she moved from Wausau.




Many of you remember that Barb brought her delicious fudge to church often, especially to our Christmas Eve cookie reception. Anita Stahl made Barb's fudge for the very first potluck held in the new kitchen, and she kindly shared the recipe with us:

Barb Seegert's Famous Fudge


- 4 1/2 C sugar
- 2T butter
- Pinch salt
- 14 1/2 oz evaporated milk
- 32 large marshmallows (approx. 2C)
- 12oz semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 12oz German sweet chocolate
- 1 square unsweetened chocolate (optional)
- 2 C nuts (optional)

Mix first 4 ingredients in a stainless steel bowl before turning on the burner. Boil for 6 minutes. Add marshmallows and allow to melt. Add chocolate and allow to melt. Add nuts. These additions must happen quickly before fudge begins to set while you are still stirring. Pour into greased 15 x 10 x 1 pan. Allow to cool for one hour before cutting with a pizza cutter. Remove fudge from the pan after several hours. Bring to church and share with friends. Makes 5lbs.

Dear Friends,

We are at the close of our three year interim with Rev. Laurie, with our search committee selecting and presenting a candidate to our congregation at the end of April and Laurie ending her time with us May 21, 2017. At the outset, a two or three year interim period have seemed an eternity, but when considering all the work involved it is more like a blink of the eye. Our church is at an exciting point as we prepare to call a new minister, but it is time first to pause, reflect on our journey and extend our sincere thanks to Laurie.

According to the UUA, an interim period follows the end of one relationship and precedes the beginning of another and provides breathing space and a time for review, assessment and self examination to allow the congregation to grow into and own its identity. The information page on the UUA website states, "Because interim ministers are 'pre-fired', they are well-positioned to shine light on uncomfortable truths and effect difficult changes that can move a congregation toward greater health and readiness for a new ministry."

During this interim period Laurie has supported us through the deaths of a number of beloved members and has welcomed in some wonderful new members. She has made great connections with the other downtown churches and the local synagogue. She has worked closely with NAOMI and received a racial justice grant from the UUA. She has been instrumental in starting community conversations and dialogue, opening our doors for the Black Lives Matter marches and other events. Laurie has helped to increase awareness and move this community along a continuum of understanding and growth.

We emerge from this interim period fiscally quite strong and with a Board motivated to explore and become even better stewards of our church's finances with an eye to the future and readiness for any unexpected economic downturns. Laurie has worked hard with key members on stewardship and has really driven home the idea that this



is a year round process. She has also helped to build Board leadership by bringing in consultants.

An interim's role is not to keep us comfortable and content, but to challenge and question us, while keeping the lights on and the doors welcoming and open. Here we are now, successfully poised and ready, with eyes more open and more sure of who we are, having worked together to define our covenant, our mission and our vision. I have served on the Board throughout Laurie's interim period and had the joy of hosting her in my home. Thank you, Laurie for working and traveling with us on this journey. Also, thank you Michael for your work with us on a number of projects, including development of our website, and for straddling your lives between Wausau and Minneapolis for the past three years. We wish you and your family much happiness in the future and hope you carry a piece of Wausau forward with you in your heart. We send you forth with much love and sincere gratitude.
