2018 Stewardship Campaign Update



We’re SO PROUD to announce that **UU Wausau’s “New Beginnings” 2018 Stewardship campaign not only met — but EXCEEDED — its pledge goal of \$255,000!**

We wish to extend a **heartfelt THANK-YOU** to ALL those involved who contributed to support our church’s mission — as well as its vision for the future. **All told, we received 113 pledges totaling \$262,833.**

In addition, BOTH of the incentive-based \$7,500 matching grants were met:

\$7,500 BONUS GRANT for new Members who had never pledged before

\$7,500 BONUS GRANT for Members who increased their pledge by at least 15% above their pledge from the previous year

These two grants earned UU Wausau an extra \$15,000 donated by a generous member of UU Wausau because YOU stepped up to pledge, either for the first time or 15%+ over and above last year’s pledge. Thanks for helping us secure these BONUS funds.

We’re eager to extend UU Wausau’s reach into the community even further.

🍄 **Movies with Meaning**

Join us on February 22 at 6:30pm for a viewing of the documentary *The Shock Doctrine*, based on **Naomi Klein's** book by the same name. Using "Shock Therapy" as a metaphor, the film investigates Klein's central idea of "disaster capitalism". When countries are jolted by catastrophic events they are subjected to totally un-regulated "free market" remedies that benefit corporations at public expense. The film traces the doctrine's beginnings from the theories of **Milton Friedman** and the Chicago School economists through its implementation over the past 40 years in Pinochet's Chili, Yeltsin's Russia, Thatcher's Britain, and the American invasions of Afghanistan and Iraq.

A Message about receiving the Love in Action Award from Brian's sermon on Sunday, January 21

It was a rare privilege to accept the Love in Action Award at the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Banquet on Monday, January 15th. People for the Power of Love chose our church as the first recipient of their distinguished honor. The award celebrates our church's commitment to social justice, and also what we symbolize to the community: justice, hope, and most of all, love.

Furthermore, the award was a recognition of the Rev. Laurie Bushbaum's unwavering commitment to championing justice for all people, especially those who are forced to the margins of society: immigrants, minority groups, and all others who suffer from being uncared for in times of hunger, oppression, and disregard.

What Laurie, this church, and our greater religious movement share is a willingness to have difficult conversations and engage in the challenging work of justice making. But doing so isn't easy. It's hard to listen as someone describes what it's like to be a victim of injustice. It's hard to listen as someone tells you about the death of their loved one who died or was forever damaged because of gun violence, or police brutality, or insufficient access to medical treatment. But as hard as it is to learn of such horrors, try imagining what it's like to be a victim. We listen and we act because that's what our faith demands.

Our faith demands that, like Dr. King, we say "together" when others say "separate"; it demands that we say "peace" when others say "war"; that we say "love" when others say "hate"; and it demands that we keep showing up.

Dr. King believed "That our world is in dire need of a new organization – the International Association for the Advancement of Creative Maladjustment." We must resist the urge to wait for others to do the work for us. We must resist the urge to give into despair. And we must resist the urge to assume we're not enough. Being maladjusted is proof that you've opened your heart to the world, that you haven't turned away.

Dr. King's conviction is that "Through such maladjustment we will be able to emerge from the bleak and desolate midnight of man's inhumanity to man, into the bright and glittering daybreak of freedom and justice."

After I was presented the award and started to make my way off stage a small group of people stopped to congratulate me. A man in the midst of the well-wishers took my hand and said, "Our eyes are on you, and our hearts are with you." On a personal level, I feel challenged and, if I'm honest, somewhat frightened by those words. It's intimidating to know that people look to you as a defender of justice and equity. But I refuse to give into my fear. I refuse to give into my fear because I believe in all of you.

I believe that each and every one of you are capable of moving that needle from injustice to justice, and seeing, in the words of the great Unitarian minister Theodore Parker, "a continual and progressive triumph of the right."

Congratulations on your award. You certainly earned it. Now, let's keep earning it.


