

In the scriptures, we read that as Jesus made his way into Jerusalem, people throughout the city gathered to lay their cloaks upon the ground to show respect for the rabbi. They marveled because rumor had it this man performed miracles. But also, they marveled because here, embodied in this poor refugee from a hillbilly city, was someone who challenged the oppressive Roman Empire. This Sunday we will meditate on Jesus' life and work, but also on human-kind's duty to serve others; and the big things that become possible when the small things start to add up.



From a Window on Grant

The recent events in Parkland, Florida, have me experiencing a lot of mixed emotions of which hopelessness, rage, sorrow, and humility are chief among. Each day I read op-eds and articles about the responses from some of our elected leaders. That, in itself, can induce fury. Politicians are, by nature, somewhat slow to act. In principle, I'm okay with that. No decision, especially when its repercussions become the lived experience of the American people should be done without careful consideration. But therein lies my sorrow: nothing, for years, seems to have changed.



Littleton, Colorado; Blacksburg, Virginia; Aurora, Colorado; Newton, Connecticut; Charleston, South Carolina; Roseburg, Oregon; and now Parkland, Florida. It's not like we don't have any reason to feel angry or hopeless, or both. I find it so painful to acknowledge that tragedies like this occur with horrific frequency. So, it came as no surprise to me that survivors of the tragedy in Parkland were quick to counter peoples' thoughts and prayers with demands for action.

This has gone on far too long. That our schools, movie theaters, colleges, and houses of worship are targets for mass murderers is not only a national tragedy, it is nothing short of a collective sin of which we are all a part.

Early signs from Washington seem to be different this time. Leaders on both sides of the aisle seem to be listening to the collective voices of the young women, men, and parents of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High.

For us, keepers of the Faith, we must ensure this horrible tragedy doesn't slip from our collective attention. We cannot let it become just another piece of yesterday's news. 17 families will never hear their beloved's voice again, nor will they feel their embrace. This shouldn't be the case.

There's no way to prevent every tragedy from happening. But there are pieces of legislation that can be put into place that will make things like this harder to pull off. It is our duty to ensure this kind of violence doesn't become commonplace in our society. I don't know where best to start. But I'm going to start by writing my elected officials. Change has to start somewhere. This time I'm going to change, too. I refuse to give into my feelings hopelessness and rage. But I cannot deny my fear. So, I'm reaching out to you all for hope.


Office Space

☛ No March Second Friday Nighters


As of publication, no one has signed up to host Second Friday Nighters for March. Let the church office know if you would like to host, and Anji will send out notification if a last-minute host is found.


Treasurer's Congregation Report - through December 2017

1. Key Annual Budget Numbers:		2017 Pledges:



2. After experiencing a bit of a financial roller coaster through 2017, we finished the year in a positive financial position. Major factors influencing this result are highlighted below.
3. Total Contributions Income for 2017 was \$276,689, which was 5.8% above the budgeted \$261,500. As had been noted throughout the year, this was driven primarily by Non-Pledged Contributions, \$26,815, versus a budgeted amount of \$3,000. The 2018 budget includes higher Non-Pledged Contributions (\$10,000). It is worth noting that Plate Offerings of \$4,600 exceeded the budgeted \$3,500 by more than \$1,000 (31.4%).
4. Because of parking fee increases, \$6,967 in parking income was 38.8% higher than the budgeted \$5,020.
5. Other Receipts, which are almost entirely from building use and the auction, were about 30% below budget, \$11,900 vs. \$17,022. It is anticipated that building use income will increase in 2018, and \$10,000 is assured for 2018 from the auction apportionment previously set aside by the Board.
6. Total 2017 Income of \$300,555 was 4.2% above the budgeted \$288,542.
7. Total Expense for 2017 was \$276,582, 2.8% below the budget of \$284,490. About \$7,300 of this \$7,908 difference was in music related expenses
8. Total Income exceeded Total Expense by \$23,973. Included in this surplus was a \$5,000 transfer from the Endowment Fund. Because of the positive financial results, the Board reduced the surplus by the amount of the Endowment transfer and returned this money to Endowment.
9. 2018/2019 Prepaid Pledges total \$86,872, almost \$30,000 more than last year, and more than \$18,000 greater than the highest prepaid in the last five years. This may have been impacted by the new federal tax law.
10. As has been separately reported by the Stewardship Committee, we had a strong and successful stewardship campaign for 2018. We began 2018 with pledges exceeded our target by 4%, \$10,273. We do not anticipate that expenses will be under budget to the degree they were in 2017, so meeting our promised pledge income will have a greater impact on our ability to again realize positive financial results in 2018. An analysis of our pledge profile by pledging quartile will be included in the next quarterly Treasurer's report.




