#### -The Parson's Reflections, One Year In

On August 1, 2017, I rolled into Wausau, embarking on my first settled parish ministry. Sure, I'd been a hospital chaplain for a number of years, served various churches as a student minister and intern, but I'd never been a solo parish minister until I got up here to the edge of the great Wisconsin Northwoods. This morning I'll offer some reflections on my first year as UU Wausau's minister and share some hopes for our future.

#### -Philosophy and the Meaning of Life

Most people have wondered about the meaning of life at one time or another, but for philosophers, it is a central preoccupation. Does the question even make sense? What would an answer look like? Might there be more than one answer, or none at all? Is it the most important thing in the world, or an idle exercise for people with too much time on their hands?

Professor Emeritus Mark T. Brown taught in the Department of Philosophy at the University of Wisconsin Colleges from 1986-2017. From 2012-2018, Dr. Brown served as an instructor in the Physician Assistant Program at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, where he specialized in Bioethics. Dr. Brown is a Senior Fellow at the Wisconsin Institute for Public Policy and Service and Member of the Wausau Aspirus Hospital Bioethics Committee.

#### -What Unitarian Universalism Is & What It Isn't

Visiting with mentors, attending General Assembly in Kansas City, and preaching in several UU churches this summer gave me opportunity to think about this unique faith we practice. Unitarian Universalism is a great religion, a cathedral window through which the world is reflected in a splendid array of unique colors. But can Unitarian Universalism be everything for everyone? This morning will be a meditation on the history of our faith, where we're at as a denomination today, and where we might be headed.

#### From a Window on Grant

Getting the building all tidied up to kick-off the start of the new church has me thinking about what it means to be religious. Most religions encourage practitioners to act and believe in certain ways. Some religions are conservative and restrictive, while others are more liberal and undefined. All of this is just another way of saying that religion doesn't have a very straightforward definition.

Even so, if you claim to be a Unitarian Universalist then you're saying you're religious. I recognize there are probably as many takes on religion as there are people in this congregation. So, then, what is religion?

In the words of my colleague, the late Forrest Church, "religion is our human response to the dual reality of being alive and having to die." In other words, religion is what we do, it's how we live.

The Catholic **Saint Teresa of Calcutta** asked, "If you were to die today, what would others say about you? What was in you that was beautiful... that helped others pray better?" Far more than books or film, what influences people most is watching others live meaningful, selfless lives. After all, it is what we do that matters. If you want to know what matters most in your life just take a moment and think about how you spend your time.

**Susan Frederick-Gray**, President of the Unitarian Universalist Association, likes to say, "this is no time for a casual faith." Our faith demands much of the practitioner. We cannot be indifferent to our values and responsibilities. We have to be committed to living into the fullest expression of the love and duty we say is at the heart of Unitarian Universalism.

Not any old church or religious community will do. It's hard to find a place to call one's own. Each of us has our own needs and expectations. But I hope you find a place that speaks to your soul, a place where you find friendship, appreciation, and community. A place that challenges you to pray with your feet, to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly as the prophet says.



I hope you find a religious community you call home, a place that sets your heart afire.

When you find a religious community that's right for you it will be able to lend light in dark times. It will be a place where

friends lift you up when you're down, a place where you can unwind and laugh, and celebrate life's milestones.

This is the kind of place UU Wausau is. It's this way because of you. So, dear friends, I hope you had a relaxing and joyful summer. But mostly, I hope to see you in church.

I'm currently in the middle of meeting with teaching teams and getting our RE meeting spaces ready for the start of the year. Exciting new things are in the works for high school youth. It's shaping up to be another fantastic year in RE! At this time of year, with so many new beginning (maybe it's the teacher in me but I'm always more apt to set resolutions at this time of year than in January), I'd like to invite you to take a few moments to think about what it is that you hope your children/youth take away from our RE program. Maybe even make a list. Then I'd invite you to think about the way (and the frequency in which) your family engages with our church community. Do the two match? Given the way you participate, can your children have the outcomes you want? Or is this an area where you might consider a change?

I hope you can join us for the church picnic on September 2<sup>nd</sup> at 11:00. Everyone who will be a student this year (pre-school through college) is invited to bring their backpack to the picnic. Right at 11:00 there will be a Blessing of the Backpacks, where **Brian** will share a message and blessing with students. September 9<sup>th</sup> will be the kickoff of regular 10:30 services with our intergenerational Water Ceremony.

RE classes will begin on September 16<sup>th</sup>. Our Sunday morning RE schedule will have some changes from last year. Children 0-3 can be dropped off in the nursery starting at 10:15. All other children and youth will be asked to attend the first part of the service in the Sanctuary and move to their classes after the "Story for All Ages". If your child(ren) are in an upstairs classroom (nursery & 4K-1<sup>st</sup> grade) please pick them up at the end of the service. All children and youth in downstairs classrooms will be released at 11:45 to come upstairs and find the adult responsible for them. 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> graders in OWL will be released at 12:15.

Please be sure to fill out an RE registration form between now and September 16<sup>th</sup>. We need a new form each year for every family participating in RE.

Here's our exciting line up for class topics this year:

#### 4K-1st grade—Love Surrounds Us

Our youngest class will explore our 7 UU principles, in the context of Beloved Communityfamily/home, school, and neighborhood. Participants will engage in activities that emphasize the love they feel in community.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> grade—Free to Believe

Free to Believe explores UU sources and principles while enriching the social, emotional, and spiritual life of children. They will explore values, beliefs, and principles through hands-on activities, stories, songs, and discussions.

# 5<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> grade—Toolbox of Faith & Windows and Mirrors

This group will split the year between two programs. They'll begin with Toolbox of Faith, which invites participants to reflect on the qualities of our UU tradition, such as integrity, courage, and love, as tools they can use in their lives. The second half of the year they'll use Window and Mirrors, which focuses on diversity. The program nurtures children's ability to identify their own experiences and perspectives and to seek out, care about, and respect those of others.

#### **7<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade—Our Whole Lives**

OWL is the UUA's comprehensive sexuality curriculum. OWL equips participants with accurate, age-appropriate information on human development, relationships, personal skills, responsible sexual behavior, sexual health, and contemporary societal issues. Participants must have permission to join the group and parents must attend an orientation prior to the first session. There is a cap on the number of participants in the class and the class is currently full.

#### 9th-12th grade—Principled Music

This program uses song lyrics to start discussions on social justice issues. Social justice issues will include racism, civil rights, bullying, homophobia, gender stereotyping, income inequality, and war. Participants will be invited to submit their own ideas for songs that fit into each theme.

Lacking an easily memorized common creed, coupled with what might be called an aversion to traditional language of reverence, we UUs sometimes struggle to explain our beliefs-not just to strangers but to other UUs as well. Join UU Members for the annual Crop Walk, Sunday, October 7, in Marathon Park. More information to follow.




















### The Board Table



Yawkey Hall is finished!!! It really wasn't as long as it might have been. Getting the contractors to work on a relatively small project in the middle of a summer could have been a nightmare, but Hase construction having worked on our building so often really came though. So now the question is: what was done that cost nearly \$30,000. Not for the first time do I wish I had taken before and after pictures. (Mainly before) What so many didn't and couldn't see was the deterioration of the ceilings (and the poor patch job done many years ago), portions of the crumbling west wall, the splitting of the wood frames on the ceiling beams, and the holes in the walls in the library.

What we could see was the filthy carpet, irrevocably stained with Kool-Aid, soda, and coffee, the water stained and peeling varnish on the window ledges and the just barely hanging drapes due to broken cords and brackets pulling out of the walls.

As usual in all remodeling projects is the high cost of labor. Our plaster and lathe ceiling and walls are very labor intensive to patch, our window ledges had to be hand sanded and then refinished, and the drapes once down needed to be cleaned and the rods repaired before they went back up. Rewiring the ceiling lights were also quite labor intensive as the wiring is old and buried deep in the ceiling opening. Actually ordering the carpet, although time-consuming (nothing like carpet by committee), was the easiest part.

So here is the approximate break down. Hase bill: \$17,600. This includes the demolition to prepare for the repairs, (walls and ceiling), the mill work repairs, repair of the old men's bathroom walls, Lights: \$1,600. Carpet:\$7,000. Drapes: \$1,000.

Misc: \$1,000.

The Property committee wishes to thank all of you for your generous contributions to this project. It was exciting for us to work on it and we hope you are as happy with the results as we are. It is now truly the showcase that it was meant to be "back in the day". Use it, enjoy it and show it off!!!

PS: we are still looking into a fireplace insert (trickier than you would think) and dimmers for the overhead lights (also trickier than you would think).

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
