
Adult Religious Education

The Board Table

As the newest member of the Board, I have been given the opportunity to share a few observations. In the 14 years since my wife Tammy and I began attending First UU Wausau, there have been significant accomplishments, many changes as well as some significant challenges. The completion of the 2006 renovations which brought all new RE classrooms and the atrium was a substantial high point which seemed to bring the whole congregation together with renewed energy and pride. But it wasn't long before internal conflicts began to surface. The perceived stability of a settled minister disappeared and the tensions continued through the interim transition. Some people left, some stayed, membership, participation and money all ebbed and flowed inconsistently. Everyone was upset and everyone wondered how we would stabilize the ship and avoid shrinking into insignificance.

Fortunately, throughout all of the highs and lows, there was a core group of committed church members, many of whom served on the Board, who selflessly shouldered the existential challenges of securing the required financial resources, successfully completing the search process for a new settled minister and restoring civility and pride in First UU Wausau. To say that we all owe them a deep debt of gratitude is an understatement.

I almost feel like I joined the Board after all of the heavy lifting has been done (we have a settled minister who is widely respected. Our finances, membership and participation are all stable and growing), but the reality is that the challenges never stop, they simply continue to evolve. Past success is no guarantee for the future, so our challenge as a Board and as a congregation is to make full use of the leadership, stability and assets

which have been gifted to us by that core group of members. What we need most of all at this point is to fight the natural complacency that comes from perceived stability and work toward a much broader and deeper engagement from the entire congregation. If we are going to do more than simply celebrate our 150-year anniversary, we will need real congregational engagement. It is the only way that we can build and truly deliver on a bold vision for our mission to transform ourselves and the larger community.

Annual Summer Retreat


