Here's how Coffee Hour will work: We'll take 5-10 minutes to gather and let people get settled. We'll then create break-out rooms - random groupings of 5 or 6 people. You'll have a chance to introduce yourself and then share answers to a couple of questions (posed each week by facilitators). Each person will have about 5 minutes to speak; you are welcome to pass if you like. After half an hour, everyone will come back to the big group and we'll say goodbye for the week. This is a great way to make new friends and stay connected to old friends.



From a Window on Grant

I don't know why this is, but there always seems to be at least someone at every party who, when discovering that I'm a clergyman, tells me that they believe in God or that they're spiritual. This comment is most often followed by, "But I don't go to church anymore." They usually go on to say something like, "For me the church is nature. I can be just as religious as anyone out on the trails." "Of course you can," I say. "But are you?"

The religious educator Sophia Fahs said, "It matters what we believe." This simple yet profound statement reminds us that beliefs have and demand consequences. If you believe that your marriage is important, you are kind and trusting, forgiving and affectionate. If you believe democracy matters, you vote. If you believe your children deserve a loving home with clear boundaries and boundless love, you'll parent that way. This is what I call living a value-rich existence. And collectively we believe in education, and so we build schools. We believe in medicine and therapy and rehabilitation, and so we build hospitals. We believe in charity, and so we build shelters and distribute food.

When we really believe in something, we enact it. It becomes a behavior. We live what we believe because what we believe matters. It's never passive.

I don't doubt there are thousands who believe like Unitarian Universalists, people who cherish democratic process, reason, diversity, universal love and acceptance, and so on. But how many of those people fail to express those beliefs by not committing to a church that attempts, albeit imperfectly, to embody those values?

The church is a symbol, a gathering place for people who are actively responding to the Spirit's call to preach the truth in love, to be humble, to serve, and to be evidence of hope in a too often hopeless world.

I don't worry about the Spirit. The Spirit's eternal. What I worry about is the Spirit's demands. Because they, like the church, depend on us.

As required by the Bylaws, an annual meeting of the congregation will be held on Sunday, December 13th at 11:45 AM.

Due to safety considerations because of the coronavirus pandemic this meeting will not be held in person. Instead we will be holding our very first Zoom annual meeting. Here are additional details regarding the process:

A link to the meeting will be emailed to all members a few days before the meeting. For additional instructions on how to access Zoom or if you have any questions, please contact our congregational administrator Danika Kozlovich at danika@uuwausau.org or (715) 842-3697. You will also receive the annual report to the congregation at least 10 days before the annual meeting. This will be emailed to you unless you specifically want a copy mailed to you via the post office. You could also make arrangements to pick up a hard copy at church. Please contact Danika if you want an arrangement other than email.

Included in the annual report will be at least the following:

- reports of officers and staff
- the election of members to the Board of Trustees, the Endowment Committee, and the Nominating Committee
- an annual budget
- a revised endowment committee declaration statement
- a Treasurer term limit by-law change

We will vote on necessary business during the course of the Zoom meeting. If you are unable to attend the Zoom meeting you can also request an absentee ballot ahead of time. This would then need to be returned to the church by the day of the annual meeting in order to be included in the vote total. Again, please contact Danika if you want an absentee ballot mailed to you. All church members are allowed to vote.

The Community Focus Collection

The Community Focus Collection committee has been asked by the UU Community Suppers committee, (a part of the Social Justice committee), if we would make a CFC appeal to our community for monetary donations for the February and March suppers.

The UU Community Suppers are hosted by us 4 times a year and normally are cooked and served in the Presbyterian church. Due to the restrictions of Covid -19 the kitchen and the dining room are closed and the food is handed out basically in the parking lot. This presents real difficulty when hoping to serve a HOT meal. There is no way to keep 70-90 servings warm from 3:45-5:00. The Community Supper committee has decided to try to raise money via the Community Focus Collections to cater hot meals for those two months.

They have talked to both the Mint and Trig's deli for estimates, Mint \$7.00 and Trigs's \$6.00/serving. They will deliver and keep warm to the Church on that Sunday afternoon and then pick up. The \$500.00-\$600.00 per February and March are more than the Community Supper budget usually allows but these are really abnormal times and it just seems so right to serve a hot meal during these cold months. We have talked to the other churches who host these meals throughout the year and they too have opted to try and serve hot meals.

Committee Focus will be putting this appeal in the CW November, December, January and February just to remind our community of the need.

Hopefully when UU Wausau's turn comes around again, October and November 2021, they will be back in the Presbyterian kitchen and dining room again and back within their budget.

Checks can be made out to UU Wausau and designated for the "Community Supper". Send them to Danika and she will keep us up to date.

As Brian has stated, during these very trying times, our larger community needs us more than ever. Please donate whatever you can, and know that we appreciate it very much, as do our "clients".


The Winter Retreat will be February 5-7, 2021 at a cost of \$134/person. That cost includes:

If arriving early Friday afternoon, dinner on Friday, around 5:30pm, would be an additional fee of \$11/person.

Located on two lakes near Amherst, WI, with opportunities for snowshoeing, hiking and cross country skiing. There will be a common area for meals and gathering for games, socializing, with masks and precautions. Iola Winter Sports Club offers groomed ski trails and we will be able to watch ski jump competitions that weekend as well.

As the Reverend Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, “The Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities.”

2nd Principle: Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;

3rd Principle: Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;

4th Principle: A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;

5th Principle: The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;

6th Principle: The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;

7th Principle: Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

May we move through this month holding these principles in our hearts.


