When hearing today's Prelude, "Sonata II in F Major," by Maria Hester Park, you might wonder if she could be someone modern who decided to write in the style of Mozart. No. Although she lived in almost the same time period as Mozart and was a correspondent of Haydn, Park was a British composer, pianist, singer and teacher and has been described as one of the most prolific of 18th century women composers. It has been said that she "made her living composing the sort of music performed by Jane Austen heroines." A little Sense and Sensibility, anyone?

Much has been written about one of the world's favorite composers, Antonin Dvorak, who wrote the **American Suite in A Major** in 1894 during his time in New York. Today's "**Andante**" is the fourth movement of this Suite. Originally written for piano, it was later arranged for orchestra.

Today's Music Meditation was written by the contemporary liturgical composer from Eagen, Minnesota, Marty Haugen. Today you will hear his "World Peace Prayer" as a solo by Danika. Perhaps next year we will be able to sing it congregationally with the leadership of our choir. Joyce Poley, whom we have to thank for today's opening hymn, "When Our Heart is in a Holy Place," says that "congregational singing has the power to lift the spirit and heal the soul. Singing together touches us at an emotional level, deepening our worship and strengthening the bonds of community." Soon.......
